Keep your friends, family, neighbors, and community safe when instructed to quarantine or isolate

Panhandle total: 525, Active: 71, Recovered: 448, Deaths: 6

The virus is here, and in the foreseen time we must live with the increased prevention tools for the safety of all in our community which include quarantine and isolation. Let’s delve further into what these words really mean.

If someone has been confirmed positive with COVID, they must **self-isolate**. This means they must stay home and away from others for at least 10 days from when symptoms first appeared, at least 24 hours with no fever, and all other symptoms have improved.

If someone was a **close contact** to a positive COVID person meaning, they were less than six feet away for 15 minutes or more to a person confirmed positive with COVID. This means they must **self-quarantine** by staying home and monitoring for symptoms for 14 days since the last exposure to prevent the spread. If symptoms appear, get tested.

Date of last close contact with person who has COVID + 14 days = end of quarantine



Not abiding by self-quarantine or self-isolation requirements by health officials is enforceable as a misdemeanor offense per the Governor’s Directed Health Measure. Moreover, self-isolating and self-quarantining are proven to slow the spread of COVID in communities.

Please do your part to keep friends, family, neighbors, and communities safe so schools and businesses can remain open! If you are instructed to self-quarantine or self-isolate, please follow this important requirement.

Unified Command confirms eight more cases of COVID in the Panhandle. The investigations are underway, all close contacts will be quarantined and actively monitored for symptoms by public health officials.
